I have often referred to our community as a little oasis in a chaotic world. Signature Class 49 - Building Healthy Communities



Class 49, kicked off with Orientation at The Aloft in downtown South Bend. The new class made introductions and learned about expectations and spent time socializing with Alumni during the traditional community Meet & Greet. After a three-year hiatus, we were elated to hold an overnight retreat at the Oakwood Resort in Syracuse, IN. Two full days were filled with learning Servant Leadership concepts, discovering DiSC styles, and building relationships, and getting to know project groups.

Program days included experiential activities, speakers and site visits and the class explored themes of Arts in the Community, Community Adversity, and Community Health with a focus on mental health among others. Program day focused on skills related to the principles of servant leadership. Class 49 practiced servant leadership concepts empathy and healing while actively participating in the poverty simulation provided by Goodwill Industries. January's program day emphasized listening and awareness while learning about community collaboration and civil discourse.

Community Impact Projects followed a new process which allowed groups to immediately begin solving a specific need identified by organizations who applied for project consideration.

The closing retreat focused on a commitment to action beyond the Class 49 experience. In addition to continuing the work begun in project groups, each class member committed to helping with a program day, activity, committee, or supporting the board in the 2023 -2024 year. Class 49 will continue to make an impact in the years to come!

Concepts such as brain colors and eating frogs may not sound like terms used in a typical leadership class. However, Emerge participants utilized these concepts to identify their strengths and weaknesses as leaders and to learn how to connect with their teams. Both the Fall 2022 and Winter 2023 Emerge cohorts met for five weeks in a row to focus on learning skills to set new leaders up for success or for seasoned leaders the opportunity to refresh their skills on important topics like difficult conversations, ethical decision making, and managing across generations.

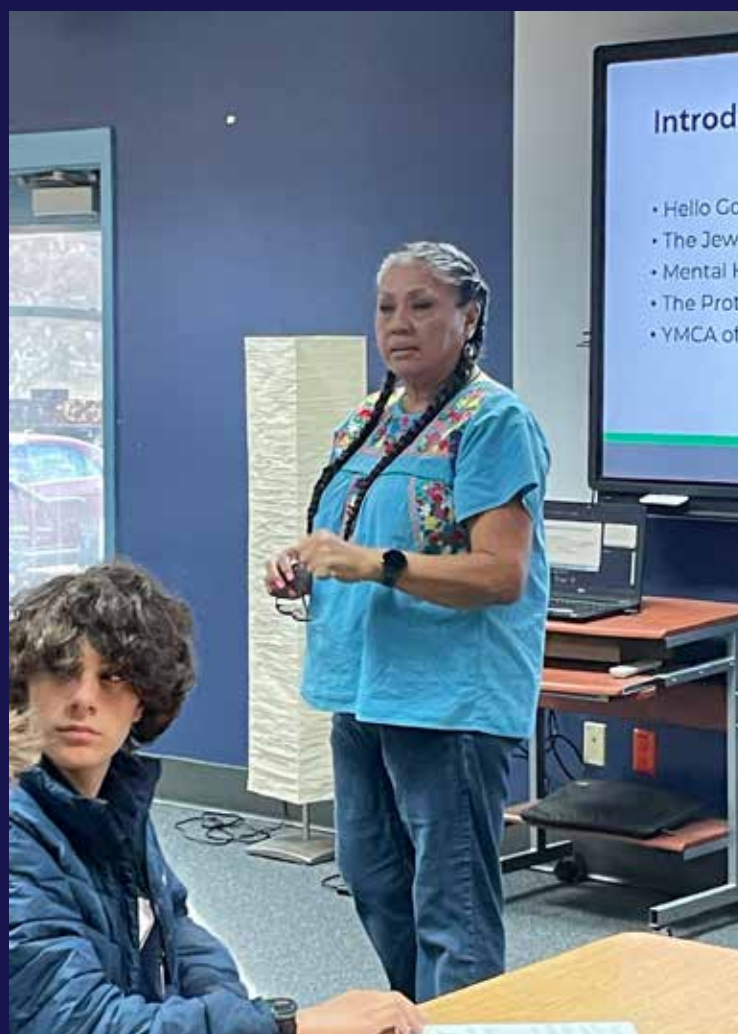

Youth Class 30 - Project Teams

Team MHAM

This project team rallied behind mental health awareness and education, partnering with Mental Health Awareness of Michiana (MHAM) to get the word out. While social media continues to grow and expand, the staff at MHAM were looking for ways to break into this digital medium. This project team helped them boost their social media presence by creating a safe space for teens to post their thoughts and feelings and educate themselves on how to get appropriate care.



Team CLVID

The Proteus, Inc. project team took on the challenge of providing safety and comfort to those who literally put food on our plates. Team CLVID was challenged to provide long sleeved shirts to migrant farmworkers in our community to help protect them from the sun and the harsh environment while collecting food. By hosting two "Cover the Court" initiatives at local high school basketball games, this team collected over 500 shirts for farmworkers in our area, but more importantly, raised awareness to the importance of this often-neglected workforce.

Team All for One

Members of Team All for One collaborated with Hello Gorgeous on an outreach project. The organization supports women going through cancer treatment emotionally, spiritually, and physically by restoring the beauty that cancer steals. The group collected letters of encouragement, comfortable socks, and delicious chocolate for care packages for Hello Gorgeous.



Team The Jewish Federation

The Jewish Federation of St. Joseph Valley collaborated with the youth on an outdoor project. Sitting on a beautiful 15-acre property and boasting one of the only low-ropes courses in the area, this team helped expand the hiking trails on the property and made way for an additional low-ropes course to begin construction. This group of leaders utilized teamwork, communication, and problem solving to make this project a success.

Team YMCA

The YMCA of Greater Michiana was looking to expand its outdoor learning space and the Team YMCA project group jumped at the chance to help. They helped create an outline for a gardening education space to use during summer camp. Gardening provides kids an opportunity to practice taking responsibility and to get excited about harvesting the fruit (or vegetable) of their labor. Team YMCA learned that helping others is not as difficult as you might think and even a small act of kindness goes a long way.



GIRLs (Growing Impactful and Resourceful Leaders) Program



Now in its third year, the Leadership SBM GIRLs (Growing Impactful and Resourceful Leaders) program took leadership to the next level. GIRLs coordinators, Tiffany Reddick and Courtney Kubley, challenged participants to take ownership of the program. Two student leaders, Sarah Burns and Isabella Carles, accepted the challenge and assisted in the planning and facilitation of program days. Maddie McBride, a senior at Notre Dame, was the intern assistant for the program.

Program days for GIRLs' sessions encompassed themes including Don't Just Sound Off, Show Up and Confidence to Create. Participants asked questions of a power panel made up of women founders of business and nonprofits. After a lesson on how to dress for success, our young women practiced new skills by attending the I Love Recovery Gala where they shared a meal and supported a local nonprofit.

To complete their leadership journey, participants planned a networking event. The GIRLs invited local professionals and practiced asking questions and conversing about professional life. The evening ended with a celebration of accomplishments, certificates, and food, of course.
